Another example of students in action has been Leon working with the Student Council. They have surveyed and the feedback from the students will see hot chocolates return soon! More information next week!



## REPORT ON GAP UNDER THE HALL

## Problem summary:

There is a gap under the hall on the treehouse side, which small balls can roll under. There is no way to retrieve such balls once they have disappeared, rolling all the way to the other side of the hall, which doesn't have any gap. Once lost, finding is impossible. But why do they need to be lost at all?








# Measurements of the gap:

The gap is 4.38 meters long, and has different elevations from the ground throughout, at points less than 5 centimeters tall, at others over ten. Here is a graph of the height of the gap after each of the 4 meters:



After 4 meters the gap is blocked by a bundle of leaves and a patch of turf:



## Balls that can fit under:

Table tennis balls could easily fit under at pretty much any point, but the main focus is on small bouncy balls and also tennis balls, which can fit under at certain heights.

## Bouncy balls (handballs):

I measured two different balls each from different companies and they both measured in at exactly six centimeters in diameter, which could fit under the gap in 3.47m out of 4.38m, equal to 79.2% of the gap.


#### Tennis balls:

According to Google AI, the average tennis ball ranges from 6.54 to 6.86cm, which seems very accurate to me. At these heights tennis balls could probably fit under a little less than handballs, but not much, as the height of the gap isn't really at the 6cm range much, as soon as the height reaches about 4cm, it starts jumping straight up to your 9 and 10cm range. I'd estimate that a tennis ball would fit under about 75% of the gap.

# **Solution Summary:**

Despite the horror of this problem, there happens to be an easy solution. Simply putting a plank of word over the gap would block it, preventing anything rolling under. I would recommend the dimensions of such a plank being 4.4 meters long, and 13 centimeters high.

# Possible application method:



Simply nailing the plank to the side of the hall above should secure it even though the bottom half cannot be nailed on, as the plank would only be around 13cm high.

Doing this would completely prevent any more balls from rolling under.
